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Ethnicity, Development and Conflict: A General Understanding

Introduction

An ethnic group is a 'people' that is defined by a common culture or national identity which sets it off from other groups. Sometimes, ethnicity is linked to a socially defined racial grouping, as it is among black Americans: but often it is based on cultural traditions that are not associated with physical traits such as distinction between the Irish-American ethnic group and the Italian-American ethnic group (Conklin. E. John: 1984). Ethnic groups are socially defined by language, religion, ancestry, life style, cultural traditions nationality and some time by physical features. The belongingness under any ethnic group is a kind of 'we feelings' which transfer from one generation to another through the process of socialization. And therefore we can say that ethnicity is an ascribed status rather than an achieved status. The similar national basis, religion, language and ritual-tradition of an ethnic group create borders in between other social groups and community, giving members of the ethnic group a sentiment of belongingness and identity and some time helping their own political and economic interest as well. Very simply an ethnicity is a group of people who basically share an identity, which is marked by a characteristic such as language, culture, leadership, or inhabited territory. One must understand that an ethnicity is, in essence, a social
